

# A nude, all-male *Hamlet* in the open air. Presented free of charge.

Walking around naked in public might seem like an insane thing to do, even if you're the Prince of Denmark.

But when your world is run by liars who tell you when to smile and what to wear, maybe "insane" is the only honest thing to be.

After making headlines with last summer's celebration of the nude female form, Torn Out Theater turns its eye to the fraught, complex world of male body image. Our bold new production of Hamlet will and ask and answer tough questions about how the male body is perceived in America today.

## THE STORY SO FAR

In the summer of 2016, an all-female cast of performers took to New York City's parks to perform Shakespeare's *The Tempest*. But this production was a little unusual: most of the cast was fully nude.

Torn Out's *Tempest* aimed to challenge audiences to see a naked body as natural, harmless. To our surprise, it did more: it provoked debates about current attitudes toward the female body all over the world. Discussion exploded on news sites and social media.

And there was something else we hadn't expected: people were talking about male bodies, too. Some asked us why only women could be empowered by their bodies. Others thanked us for "sparing" the world the unpleasant sight of male bodies. We even saw repeated claims that an all-male version would have been a sex crime worthy of riots.

In every corner of the world, it seemed, there were men who felt that their bodies were inherently unwanted.

We knew what we had to do.



Hamlet is the story of a man searching for honesty in a deceptive world. He risks everything to reveal the truth about his family, his nation, and himself. The villains of his world call him a lunatic, threaten him with exile and murder, and ultimately rob him of everything he holds dear. We mourn him, but we don't pity him. He wins. He defies society and exposes its hypocrisies. He causes chaos to restore order. He's true to himself above all else.

Torn Out's *Hamlet* re-examines the naked body, this time using an all-male cast, to claw at questions surrounding the tension between men and their bodies. The naked male body can be a symbol of classical beauty or of modern anxiety. Which is true? Which is madness?

This summer, Hamlet will find out.






